HIGHLAND PARK PLANNING AND DEVELOMENT REPORT

Welcome to the New Year – one that we hope will see our lives resuming a greater degree of normality over the coming months. Planning and development matters took a bit of a break over the holiday season and there were few new applications. As to today's date, we can report on the following applications of interest to Highland Park:

DP2020-8284 for a multi-resident apartment building at 4111 1 Street NE was approved. This is for the land sloping down along 40th / 41st Avenue into Greenview Industrial. The plans call for 169 suites of which the great majority are small 1-bedroom units. The community association had commented on the lack of diversity and choice in this proposed building and had also raised concerns about future traffic control and management. A positive feature of the approved plan is that landscaping was included for the adjacent utility right-of-way which would enable pedestrian access from Centre Street.

LOC2021-0175 for a land use change to R-CG at 457 33 Avenue NW will be proceeding to the Calgary Planning Commission (CPC) for review. If approved there, it will then go to Council. A date has not yet been set for the CPC hearing.

LOC2021-0187 for a land use change to M-CG at 3404 3 Street NW which is intended to permit the construction of a 5-unit residential building on this 63 ft lot. There would be a 5-car garage structure off the laneway. The application is still under review by the Planning department.

LOC2021-0188 for a land use change to M-CG at 4320 Centre A Street NE. The developer would like to construct a 4-plex on this parcel. The application is under review.

DP2021-5688 for construction of a rowhouse at 4024 2 Street NW is still under review and temporarily stalled pending receipt of revised plans to city planners from the developer.

LOC2021-0084 for a land use change to M-CG at 308 32 Avenue NE went to Council on January 11, 2022. According to the status displayed on the city's Development Map, the application was refused by Council. We are seeking confirmation of that decision.

The community association encourages all residents to stay informed about development proposals in the community, and to respond in a thoughtful way when provided the opportunity to do so. Status information about any Development Permit or Land Use Change application can be found on the City's Development Map at https://developmentmap.calgary.ca/. Just zoom in and click on the property you wish to examine. Details about the application, comment periods and contact information for the file manager can then be reviewed.





Daylighting Confederation Creek Elliot Lindsay – Friends of Confederation Creek

The Friends of Confederation Creek (FOCC) are a volunteerled society concerned with the preservation, protection, and restoration of the Confederation Creek watershed. This year, thanks to Watershed Stewardship Grant funding administered by the Land Stewardship Center of Canada, we have launched the "Uncovering Confederation Creek" project. This work seeks to tell the story of streams in this watershed; past and present and generate interest and discussion on the future of these important and underappreciated streams. The Confederation Creek watershed (drainage area) covers an area of 2700 hectares of NW Calgary, encompassing communities from Shaganappi Trail NW, all the way to Edmonton Trail NE on the south side of Nose Hill; from Brentwood and Varsity to Highland Park and Thorncliffe Greenview. While some sections of Confederation Creek, Queen's Park Creek, and several springs remain above ground where they can be enjoyed by the public, much of the length of these streams were buried in concrete stormwater pipes beginning in the 1950's. In addition, much of the watershed area has been converted to pavement, rooftops, roads, and hard surfaces, sending runoff rushing into concrete pipes preventing the slowing, filtering, and settling that happens in natural stream corridors and their floodplains. Fortunately, there are alternatives that many cities around the world are implementing to bring these buried streams back to life, and in doing so gain the valuable ecosystem services they provide. This exciting opportunity is commonly referred to as daylighting, and there is perhaps no better place to implement this than right here in the Confederation Creek watershed.

The organization American Rivers defines stream daylighting as a process which "...revitalizes streams by uncovering some or all of a previously covered river, stream, or stormwater drainage." While there is some debate as to the true first daylighting project, some of the earliest efforts included the San Francisco Bay area's Napa Creek project in 1970, and later the Strawberry Creek project completed in 1984 in Berkeley, California. Not long after in 1988, Zurich, Switzerland introduced a municipal policy in accordance with the "Bachkonzept" or "stream concept", which has supported the daylighting of over 21 kms of streams!

Some cities such as Yonkers, New York, have implemented stream daylighting projects right in the heart of downtown, removing several blocks worth of aging pavement and infrastructure to reveal and restore sections of the Saw Mill River, bringing migratory fish species back and improving urban life, fostering greatly increased investments along the restored river corridor and creating new and improved park spaces for citizens to enjoy. With so much of Confederation Creek and its tributaries buried beneath green spaces, the opportunities to implement stream daylighting are not only feasible, but also a real possibility. We hope to further explore this exciting topic and its potential here in the watershed, in another article this winter. Stav tuned!

Dogs must be on-leash in all public spaces in Calgary unless a sign is posted for an off-leash area. The Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw limits an off-leash dog walker to six dogs. Natural environment parks, including asphalt pathways, are on-leash, unless otherwise signed. All parking lots are on-leash, including those for designated off-leash areas.

A larger number of dogs not being controlled in off-leash parks can lead to safety concerns, such as dogs inadvertently cutting off cyclists or runners, dogs jumping on park patrons, or negative interactions with other dogs and wildlife. There is no limit to the number of dogs that can be walked onleash but an adequate number of leashes, or other means to restrain all dogs is required in an off-leash park. Any handler must respond to nuisance behaviours, maintain voice and sight command with each dog, and clean up.

Changes to the Bylaw coming into effect by September 30, 2022 will permit qualified professional dog walkers to walk more than six dogs off-leash at a time. (Otherwise, a limit would mean fewer customers, lost income, increased user costs). Applicants with adequate skills and knowledge will be able to continue walking more dogs safely, if they review and comply with the Bylaw, ensuring that each dog is licensed and has good recall.

The City will develop specific criteria by which a Dogwalker Permit would be granted in consultation with business owners through the Business Advisory Committee. Community peace officers will work with dog walkers to achieve bylaw and permit compliance through education rather than to deny or revoke a permit, unless as a last resort. The decision can be challenged through the Licence and Community Standards Appeal Board.

RECIPES FOR YOUR GOOD FOOD BOX - SHAMBHARO

Most of you are taking advantage of the e-transfer ordering option but you can still order in-person at our hall on the order night between 6:00 and 7:00 pm. To e-transfer payment, send it to me at AnneNaumann@ shaw.ca preferably by no later than 4:30 pm on the order date. That way our volunteer Good Food Box Coordinator, Bonita, and I can finalize the list of all the boxes ordered and payments received to ensure we order the correct number and size of boxes. If you are ordering for the first time, please also send us a followup email to is GoodFoodBox@hpca.ca with your contact information (phone and/or email) so we can contact you to remind you about the pick-up date and the next order date. We have also been asked by the Community Kitchen folks to provide basic demographic information about the people being served by this program through each ordering depot like HPCA's. So, if we don't have it already, we'll ask you how many total families, adults, seniors, and youth your box is for.

I personally wasn't able to order a box in January, but I thought I'd share a recipe for something else you can do with cabbage other than making coleslaw. This is a delicious East Indian dish called Shambharo. I've made it a few times for my family, and we all enjoy it. It can be a side dish, or you could probably add canned chickpeas and turn it into a one pot meal.



The Pluto Parallel

Shambharo (Fried Cabbage with Green Peppers and Carrots)

Prep and Cook Time: About 20 minutes

Serves: 4 to 6

Kitchen Supplies Needed: Vegetable peeler, sharp knife, large frying pan or pot

Ingredients:

- 1 to 1 ¹/₂ tbsp cooking oil (such as canola)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp to 1 tsp cumin seeds (can substitute $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp cumin or coriander powder)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp black mustard seeds (can substitute yellow mustard seeds, or up to $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp of dry mustard powder)
- 1 to 4 green chilies, chopped (can substitute a few rings of sliced jarred or canned jalapeno chilies)
- 1/2 large green cabbage or 1 small green cabbage, finely sliced and chopped into bits
- ¹⁄₄ tsp turmeric powder
- 1 tsp cumin or coriander powder
- 1 to 2 carrots, peeled and thinly sliced across (or cut into matchsticks)
- 1/2 to 1 green pepper, cored and thinly sliced
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- · Salt and sugar to taste
- Optional additions: 1 can of chickpeas, drained, rinsed, and drained again (add after cabbage)

Directions:

- 1. Peel carrots, core green pepper and chilies. Slice and chop all vegetables. Gather all spices.
- 2. In the large pan or pot, heat the oil. When hot, add the cumin seeds and mustard seeds. Let them pop and crackle for a few seconds. Add the chilies and stir together.
- 3. Add the cabbage and stir everything together. Add the turmeric and cumin powder and cook together for about 5 minutes.
- 4. Add the sliced carrots and green pepper. Stir to mix all together until it gets a little soft but not soggy.
- 5. Remove from heat and stir in lemon juice. Taste, and add salt or sugar, or additional spices to adjust taste.


